

And, for built-up areas, there are a number of apps that locate constellations when you hold your device up to the sky. If you share a curiosity of the natural world, enjoy going outdoors or feel like doing something different, things are looking up ...



2. Ice skating

A classic winter activity, ice skating is (ironically) also a great ice breaker. You'll either get to show off your secret skills or have to hold tight to your skating partner as you tackle the rink together. Visit one of London's most iconic landmarks by testing out the ice rink at [Alexandra Palace \[http://www.alexandrapalace.com/ice-rink/\]](http://www.alexandrapalace.com/ice-rink/), or catch the temporary ice rinks at [Canary Wharf \[http://www.icerinkcanarywharf.co.uk/\]](http://www.icerinkcanarywharf.co.uk/) or the [Eden Project \[http://www.edenproject.com/visit/whats-on/ice-skating\]](http://www.edenproject.com/visit/whats-on/ice-skating) in Cornwall before they go. What's more, there are indoor ice-rinks [across the UK \[http://skating-rinks.co.uk/\]](http://skating-rinks.co.uk/) that are open to the public all year round, just make sure you bring someone who won't laugh at you (too much) when you inevitably fall over.



3. Theatre

In London, go to [Soho Theatre \[https://sohotheatre.com/whats-on/\]](https://sohotheatre.com/whats-on/) for the best in up-and-coming comedy acts the city has to offer, or [Battersea Arts Centre \[https://www.bac.org.uk/content/43626/whats_on/whats_on/shows/reclaiming_the_classics\]](http://www.bac.org.uk/content/43626/whats_on/whats_on/shows/reclaiming_the_classics) for contemporary re-imaginings of theatre classics. If you're fans of drag, the [Queer Contact festival \[https://contactmcr.com/festival/queercontact/\]](http://contactmcr.com/festival/queercontact/) celebrates its 10th anniversary in Manchester this year, with plays and spoken word performances. Wherever you are, check out your local theatre, independent cinema or gig venue, and honour Saint Valentine by showing your love of the arts.



4. Urban axe throwing
